THE FOURTH YEAR OF PHASE III OF METROPOLIS BRITISH COLUMBIA

Metropolis British Columbia (MBC) is a policy research centre with goals in both research and the communication of knowledge. We are a key focal point for academics and community members to get together to exchange ideas, strengthen research and communicate research findings. Our stakeholders include familiar actors like policy-makers in federal, provincial, regional and municipal governments, and also people working on immigration- and diversity-related social processes in the non-governmental organisation sector. We measure ourselves by how well we produce research, and how well we communicate it. The purpose of this document is to give a sense of both our research output and the scope of our communication activities over the fourth year of Phase III of the Metropolis Project.

We have had serious and sustained commitment on the part of our stakeholders in both provincial and federal governments, and more recently, from our partners in the NGO world. We have maintained our relationships with our major funders: core funding is provided by a coalition of federal partners through the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) of Canada and amounts to \$300,000 per year. In January 2010, SSHRC conducted a midterm review of MBC (and the other four Canadian Metropolis Centers), and decided to renew our funding for a fourth and fifth year. Additional core funding is provided by the BC government through what was then the Ministry of Regional Economic and Skills Development (now the Ministry of Jobs, Tourism and Innovation) in the amount of \$100,000 annually. This latter commitment was renewed in April 2011 to cover the fifth year of the project as well. Finally, our university partners of Simon Fraser University, the University of British Columbia (Vancouver and Okanagan) and the University of Victoria contribute approximately \$200,000 annually in cash, space and staff.

Our large base of core funding greatly enhances our capacity to produce and disseminate knowledge relative to other similar research centers. We have also negotiated five funded graduate student research internships (annually) with MITACS/Accelerate BC. These have also expanded our research capacity, adding \$75,000 to our research budget this year and, perhaps more importantly, deepening our relationships with partner organizations.

RESEARCH OUTPUT

The major research outlet for MBC is its working paper series. Typically, MBC publishes 12-18 working papers per year in its series, and the past year has been on the mark with 15 working papers published between April 2010 and March 2011. These working papers include research in all of our research domains, and as with all working papers in Phase III, each working paper comes with an associated *Policy Briefing Note* which presents its main findings in a one page nontechnical format.

Our new working papers covered a gamut of topics within our mandate of research on immigration and ethnic diversity. A working paper by Perrin (10-05) found many similarities among the countries involved in human trafficking and suggested legislative means to combat trafficking based on these. Pottie-Sherman (11-01) considers the broad theoretical question of how diversity connects with markets, and a complementary paper by Chen and Jacks (10-09) finds that immigrants influence trade patterns, and foster both the breadth and depth of Canadian international trade.

Pendakur and Pendakur (11-05) present evidence that inter-ethnic inequality in Canada has not diminished over the past 20 years, even as Canadian society has become radically more ethnically diverse. However, Cuff et al (10-14) find theoretical reasons to suspect that the inequality between formal and informal workers' compensation may be much less than suspected. So, perhaps things are better than they seem.

COMMUNICATION

MBC held 11 events this year, including the national Metropolis Conference, our annual retreat, and several workshops, master classes, and symposia for graduate students. These events were designed to connect scholars, policy-makers and front-line workers with each other to better understand, better use and better create our research. We began the (fiscal) year with an interdisciplinary conference in Vancouver in June 2010 on the Asian Migration, attended by about 40 academic researchers. In July, September and October of 2010, we held smaller workshops, with attendance ranging from 14-50, on various specific topics including: Aceh Migrants; Markets and Diversity; and Homelessness. E-symposia were held in April and September 2010, and in February 2011 a Policy Research Symposium was held on Immigration, Multiculturalism and Social Change in Canada.

Our flagship event, of course, was the National Metropolis Conference held in Vancouver from 23-26 March 2011. Over 1100 people from all walks of life registered. The conference included six plenary panels with distinguished speakers and over one hundred workshop and roundtable sessions on a wide variety of topics related to immigration and cultural diversity. The conference discussed the scale and nature of Canada's immigration system and the policies and practices that have emerged to foster the socio-economic inclusion of new Canadians. Speakers from elsewhere in the world also participated, helping to explain the migration and integration dynamics of their regions and thereby allowing us to understand better the effects of these trends on Canada. The event was a great success, and a feather in the cap for MBC.

MBC's support of dissemination events has increased greatly over the first four years of Phase III, and we anticipate further strength in this area in our final year.

Another aspect of MBC's communication footprint is its support of dissemination projects. Over 2008 and 2009, we held our first and second Calls for Proposals for dissemination projects. Three projects were supported in the 2008-2009 grant cycles (four of these have provided outputs, linked on our website), and six projects were supported in 09/10.

13th NATIONAL METROPOLIS CONFERENCE

“BRINGING THE WORLD TO CANADA”

March 23-26, 2011

The Metropolis National Conference “Bringing the World to Canada” took place from March 23-26, 2011 at the Sheraton Wall Centre in Vancouver and brought together nearly 1100 delegates, mostly from Canada, but also from abroad.

The first day consisted of five full day pre-conference events with well over 300 participants. These sessions addressed Francophone Immigration, Foreign Credential Recognition, Community Resilience, and Immigration Levels and Labour Supply Forecasting, along with one dedicated solely to Graduate Student Development. Two full-day study tours visiting relevant agencies were also conducted that day, garnering excellent feedback from participants. A Welcome Reception was hosted for delegates with brief comments by the organizing committee and the Mayor of Vancouver. During the three days that followed, the audience heard six plenary sessions with high profile speakers from all sectors, along with several policy addresses. The delegates also participated in the almost 100 workshop and roundtable sessions that covered the six Metropolis priority areas. Another highlight was the Networking Dinner, which incorporated cuisine from various cultures, as well as a Bhangra dance performance that captivated the audience.

In total, The Metropolis BC centre was able to support 32 graduate students and, thanks in part to a contribution from the BC government, 27 immigrant-serving agencies. The number of actual attendees from NGOs is higher, due to the introduction of the ‘Association Pass’ which allows multiple people to use the same pass to attend different parts of the conference. Evaluations that were received confirmed the success of the conference with the vast majority of respondents answering ‘Excellent’ or ‘Good’ to all questions. Every attempt was made to attract media, and while the initiative was successful (see http://mbc.metropolis.net/media_National_Conf_2011.html for articles), a federal election was called during the conference which shifted the focus of many media. RESEARCH AND DISSEMINATION PROJECTS

MBC held calls for proposals (CFPs) for research and dissemination projects, which were announced in October 2010 and closed in January 2011. These were quite successful calls for proposals: the research CFP attracted 20 applications, almost a record high for MBC. In our February 2011 adjudication (and including subsequent revised applications), we awarded 12 research grants. These grants totaled a commitment of approximately \$330,000, and we are very hopeful that their output will be at least as good as the last round.

Our CFP for dissemination projects was a bit disappointing. We received two applications for funding, and funded a single dissemination project. Unlike the 2009 CFP for dissemination proposals, we did not hire a third-party communications consultant to "spread the word" and beat the bushes for dissemination projects. Thus, we conclude that such activity may be essential for future dissemination CFPs.

MBC allocated nearly \$340,000 to research and dissemination projects in the February 2011 adjudications. This funding envelope is more than double the size of any other Metropolis center in Canada. As a result, MBC has a strong research presence both in Canada and internationally.

FOR THE FUTURE

The SSHRC program that funded MBC (and the other four regional Metropolis Centres) runs out in March 2012. All five Centres will end their formal operations at that time if new funding is not secured. MBC is working on two avenues for funding renewal.

First, MBC is currently in negotiation with the Province of British Columbia to secure funding to continue MBC's activities in communication and research. This negotiation is based in large measure on the goodwill generated over the past four years of solid cooperation and coordination between MBC and our provincial partners. We have every hope that it will succeed.

Second, Krishna Pendakur is leading an initiative to create a Canadian Metropolis Centre (CMC). The final proposal, to be submitted to SSHRC in Fall 2011, will request approximately \$5 million to create a research centre located at Simon Fraser University for the period 2012-2019. This national research centre will have a mandate for research and communication in the areas of immigration and ethnic diversity, and it will in some sense 'replace' the five regional Metropolis Centres. Like MBC, it will have annual CFPs, but these will be open to researchers from across Canada, and will be open to research topics that are geographically dispersed across the country.

Our hope is that both these avenues can be fruitful and coordinated. One possibility is that MBC continues with provincial funding and CMC begins with federal (SSHRC) funding, and they act as separate but coordinated research agencies. Another possibility is that MBC is

fully integrated into the management structure of CMC. Time will tell what roads we are able to follow.

ACTIVITIES ACROSS OUR RESEARCH DOMAINS

(contributed by the relevant Domain Leaders)

HOUSING & NEIGHBOURHOODS: *Carlos Teixeira, UBC-Okanagan*

In recent years, there has been increasing attention paid to the relationship between access to affordable housing and the residential concentrations of newcomers and minorities on the one hand, and successful integration and inclusion on the other. For these individuals and families, not only the type of housing but also the neighbourhood in which it is found, impacts upon and helps to many aspects of social life. These include social networks, access to employment opportunities, participation in and access to public social spaces, the nature and availability of social services, and general sense of security. In this policy priority, we seek to better understand the relationship between housing, neighbourhoods and integration into Canadian society.

Overview/Summary of Activities: 2010 - 2011

Researchers affiliated with the Metropolis MBC have published important work during 2010-2011 dealing with a range of issues related to *housing and neighbourhoods*. Looking at the 2010-2011 published literature in this domain, the following research themes/areas of research were identified: a) Housing Careers/Barriers (Experiences, Situation and Needs); b) Housing and Homelessness; c) Neighbourhoods, Settlement and Housing Services (Institutions, Settlement services, etc.); d) Social Geography of Immigrants/Minorities and Ethnic Neighbourhoods; e) New Immigrants and Second-Tier-Cities; and f) Changing Residential Neighbourhoods.

Important MBC working papers in this domain were those by Priya Kissoon, “(Dis)Advantages of Illegality: Exploring Uprootedness and Homelessness Among Non-Status Migrants in Vancouver and Toronto” (WP 10-11); and Carlos Teixeira, “Housing Immigrants and Newcomers in Central Okanagan, BC” (WP 10-03). In addition, Carlos Teixeira (Guest Editor) published a special issue on “Newcomer’s Experiences of Housing and Homelessness in Canada” in Canadian Issues (Association of Canadian Studies).

With regard to *knowledge transfer* our research affiliates did a great job by sharing their research with the local/national media (regional, provincial and national newspapers, radio stations and TV) as well as building strong relationships with the local community, different levels of government, with numerous non-government partners in B.C. and with other Canadian and international academics. The recent National Metropolis Conference which took place in Vancouver (March 2011) shows how our researchers interacted with the media by sharing with them not only the main results of their research but also the main goals of Metropolis. Two important events were the *B.C. Housing Conference* which took place at the University of British Columbia-Okanagan (February 2011) and the National Metropolis Conference in

Vancouver (March 2011) where a significant number of our research affiliates were involved in organizing different roundtables and/or workshops.

CITIZENSHIP AND SOCIAL, CULTURAL & CIVIC INTEGRATION: *Paul Bramadat, University of Victoria (acting domain leader)*

Within this domain one finds scholars and policy makers from a wide range of academic and practitioner perspectives. As such, while issues related to citizenship, belonging, inclusion, discrimination, multiculturalism, and religious diversity are common themes, the research and networking that occur within this domain reflect the intellectual heterogeneity of its members. At present, there are four MBC funded research projects underway within this domain. These include David Ley's "Highway to Heaven: New suburban religious landscapes and immigrant integration," Geraldine Pratt's "Education and labour market outcomes for Filipino youth in Vancouver," Miu Chung Yan's "Out-migrating or returning migrant: A study of young Chinese-Canadians in Hong Kong," and Nancy Johnston's "Investigating barriers to PSE academic success for new immigrant and international students at SFU." These projects demonstrate both academic rigour as well as a commitment to policy relevance and will be completed between March 31, 2011 and September 31, 2011.

As usual, Metropolis BC working papers have proven to be an excellent means of disseminating the innovative research conducted on the array of issues associated with this domain. MBC research contributions to debates on citizenship and integration included: Jenny Francis's "Missing Links: Youth programs, social services, and African youth in Metro Vancouver" (WP 10-07); Zheng Wu, Christoph M. Schimmele, and Feng Hou's "Social integration of immigrants and their children in Canada's urban neighborhoods" (WP 10-10); Oliver Schmidtke and Steffen Neumann's "Engaging the migrant community outside of Canada's main metropolitan centres. Community engagement—the Welcoming Community initiative and the case of Greater Victoria" (WP 10-13); Ashley Bradimore and Harald Bauder's "Mystery ships and risky boat people: Tamil refugee migration in the newsprint media (WP 11-02); Yolande Pottie-Sherman's "Markets and diversity: An overview" (WP 11-01) and Priya Kisson's "(Dis)Advantages of illegality: Exploring uprootedness and homelessness amongst non-status migrants in Vancouver and Toronto" (10-11).

At the MBC annual research retreat on October 14, 2010, roughly 45 participants engaged in a full day of discussions related to the future of the Metropolis Project as well as research themes closely related to the citizenship domain. For example, Paul Bramadat gave a presentation on a research project entitled "Religion, Radicalization and Securitization," Scott Graham (of the Social Planning and Research Council of BC) discussed the positive relationship between MBC-funded research and the priorities of settlement agencies, and Kenny Zhang (Asia Pacific Foundation) addressed the cultural and political implications of sizable number of Canadians living abroad.

On February 2nd, the domain hosted an all-day policy research symposium entitled "Religion and Society: A Policy-Research Symposium on Immigration, Multiculturalism, and Social Change in Canada." The event was held at the Wosk Centre in Vancouver, and attracted

roughly 90 participants from the government, non-governmental organizations, and academy. One session, “Space, Place and the Sacred” featured three presentations related to the ways religious diversity is expressed within three urban Canadian contexts; another session featured government and community stakeholder accounts of projects and policies related to the management or response to religious diversity; the final session of the day examined the future expressions of religious diversity within a possibly “post-secular” Canada. The day was a tremendous success in terms of its attendance, organization and execution, the quality of the research featured, and the kinds of relationships that were fostered between participants during the coffee breaks and lunch.

ECONOMICS AND LABOUR MARKET INTEGRATION: *David Jacks, Simon Fraser University*

The past year has been another fruitful one for the Economics and Labour Market Integration domain. The domain’s work on documenting and explaining some of the most vital issues facing both BC and Canada with respect to immigration and diversity has continued apace and offers great prospects for the future.

A number of projects funded under earlier calls for research have yielded papers for inclusion in the Metropolis Working Paper series. First, Kalaw (SFU) and Gross (SFU) analyze reported violations of employment standards under the auspices of the Live-in Caregiver Program using a survey of live-in caregivers in Vancouver; they find that, in most instances, the differences in caregivers’ personal characteristics drive little of the variation in the data and conclude that the problem of violations almost certainly stems from the adverse incentives presented to employers in the program’s current format. Chen (Shanghai University of Finance and Economics) and Jacks (SFU) address the issue of the gains from international trade and how immigrants influence this process particularly in the context of the explosion of import variety over the past 20 years; they find large effects for the years from 1988 to 2007: import varieties grew by 76%, this growth is associated with a welfare gain to Canadian consumers as large as 28%, and that enhanced immigration flows in this period may be responsible for 25% of this variety growth and its attendant welfare gains for native-born Canadians. Thus, the paper informs the immigration debate in Canada along previously unconsidered dimensions and shows that they matter. Finally, Cuff (McMaster), Marceau (UQAM), Mongrain (SFU), and Roberts (Calgary) contribute to the theoretical literature related to the optimal policies of government when firms are able to evade taxes and workers are able to evade border enforcement; in this context, they find that wages are always equalized between domestic and undocumented workers, even if they do not work in the same sectors of the economy, a result driven by the interaction of firm level decisions with optimal government policy. At the same time, former working papers in the series have subsequently been published in the past year in outlets such as *American Economic Journal: Public Policy*, *Canadian Public Policy*, and *the Journal of International Migration and Integration*.

As to future research output, in the past funding cycle, Metropolis BC sponsored four projects (three of which are led by new researchers), ensuring a healthy pipeline of future

working papers and publications addressing some of the most pressing issues in the area of economic and labour market integration.

SETTLEMENT, INTEGRATION & WELCOMING COMMUNITIES: *Julie Drolet, Thompson Rivers University*

The domain brings together researchers, practitioners and policy makers from a variety of academic disciplines and perspectives. This year, there were five MBC funded research projects underway within this domain. These included:

- Jennifer Hyndman’s “Operation Swaagatam: Pre-post refugee arrival and research development”;
 - Robert Sweet’s “Ethno-linguistic differences in post-high school pathways”;
 - Sean Lauer’s “Acculturation stress and health: The mediating effect of social capital”;
 - Daniel Hiebert’s “Superdiversity and ethno-cultural integration in metropolitan Vancouver”;
 - Brian O’Neill’s “Settlement experiences of lesbian, gay, and bisexual newcomers in BC”.
- These projects will be completed between March 31, 2011 and March 31, 2012.

The Metropolis BC working papers submitted and reviewed in this domain include:

The domain leader participated in the MBC annual research retreat on October 14, 2010, in discussions related to the future of the Metropolis Project as well as research themes closely related to the settlement, integration and welcoming communities domain.

This year the domain leader presented in the workshop "Comparative Perspectives on Settlement and Integration: The European Union and Canada" (Session WS-28) at the 15th International Metropolis Conference in The Hague, Netherlands (October 2010). She also participated in the Priority Planning Meeting in Ottawa and adjudication of abstracts for the National Metropolis 2011 Conference (on November 24-25, 2010).

On February 2nd, the domain co-hosted an all-day policy research symposium entitled “Religion and Society: A Policy-Research Symposium on Immigration, Multiculturalism, and Social Change in Canada.” The event was held at the Wosk Centre in Vancouver, and attracted about 90 participants from the government, non-governmental organizations, and universities. The domain actively participated in the planning of this event, and co-chaired an open discussion on post-secularism (with Paul Bramadat) and chaired a panel session “Policy to Project – “On

the Ground” Case Studies”. The policy research symposium organized by Metropolis BC and the Ministry of Regional Economic and Skills Development was a very successful event.

The domain leader participated as a member of the 2011 Research Grant Adjudication Committee, on February 10, 2011, which resulted in several new research grant awards in the settlement, integration and welcoming communities domain.

Many members of the domain participated in the 2011 National Metropolis Conference in Vancouver. The domain leader presented three research papers at the National conference.

In 2010, Julie Drolet (Co-Investigator), with PI Agnes Meinhard (and other researchers) were awarded \$125,000 for a national study on “Immigrant Integration and Inclusion: Investigating the Canadian Partnership Model from a Complex-System Perspective” funded by SSHRC-Metropolis. The study will be completed in December 2011.

JUSTICE, POLICING AND SECURITY: Krishna Pendakur, SFU (for Ben Perrin, UBC)

MBC has put substantial effort into increasing the research capacity of the Justice and Policing domain. This has had some measure of success. In terms of communication activities, the National Conference provided an excellent venue to get policymakers and researchers together, and several workshops at the conference supported this type of interaction. A full day pre-conference session on Community Resilience was hosted in partnership with Public Safety Canada, and one plenary session, entitled ‘Diaspora Politics and Imported Conflicts’ addressed this issue from a number of different angles. Our hope is that, as in the past, these types of interactions will support future research and the growth of knowledge in this important area.

The most obvious payoff to our investment in the Justice and Policing domain has been in the new working papers that MBC published in its working paper series over 2010/11. Ben

Perrin's (10-06) paper focuses on identifying similarities in trafficking countries that may be used in legal frameworks to combat human trafficking. Priya Kisson (10-11) draws attention to how illegal migrants in Vancouver and Toronto face subtle disadvantages in their housing and refugee claimant paths. Cuff et al (10-14) offer theoretical work to show that, when policy responds optimally to the presence of an illegal sector in the labour market, disparity in compensation between legals and illegals disappears. Finally, Bradimore and Bauder (11-02) show that media responses to illegal migrations, specifically the Tamil refugee boats in 2009, may exacerbate hostile feelings towards the immigrants in general.

Another interesting development in this domain was the launch of Ben Perrin's Invisible Chains, a popular-press book on Canada's underworld of human trafficking. This important work brings his career of research contributions directly into the public eye, at a time when federal policymakers are seriously considering legislation to combat trafficking.

ABSTRACTS

TITLE: OUTSOURCING THE BORDER: FOREIGN WORKER RECRUITMENT AND THE MANAGEMENT OF MEXICAN MIGRATION TO CANADA

DOMAIN: Economic & Labour Market Integration

P.I.: *Geraldine Pratt*, Department of Geography, University of British Columbia

In recent years, Canada has shifted toward micro-level temporary migration policies to address economic and demographic challenges. Unprecedented numbers of migrants are arriving with temporary status through programs such as the Temporary Foreign Worker Program, increasingly from developing countries to work in lower-skilled occupations (CIC 2009). In the context of ever more circular global labour mobility, contracted labour brokers have become pivotal actors, in many cases taking on traditional state practices of gatekeeping that impact the size, composition, and geography of migrant pathways. Building on a burgeoning literature on the migration industry and neoliberal globalization, this research will examine the largely unexplored role third-party recruiters play in enabling and regulating foreign labour mobility and how the recruitment process itself impacts program outcomes, specifically in terms of employer goals and migrant worker integration. The project will, first, trace the recruitment process for foreign workers by third-party agents, considering the difference between state-run and third-party recruitment; second, explore possible disjuncture(s) between state policy, market demands, and the reality of immigrant selection; and third, analyze how the recruitment process impacts the migration and integration experiences of foreign workers in Canada. The project focuses on Mexican migration to British Columbia and Manitoba for work in unskilled or semi-skilled hospitality/tourism occupations through the Temporary Foreign Worker and/or Provincial Nominee Programs.

TITLE: MEETING THE NEEDS OF NEWCOMERS: UNDERSTANDING THE CHALLENGES FACING RECENTLY ARRIVED IMMIGRANTS AND REFUGEES TO ACCESS SETTLEMENT SERVICES IN THE VANCOUVER REGION

DOMAIN: Citizenship and Social, Cultural and Civic Integration

P.I.: *Daniyal Zuberi*, Department of Sociology, University of British Columbia

As the inner city sections of Canadian metropolitan areas undergo gentrification, visible minority newcomers are increasingly settling suburban communities, where many are living in areas with higher levels of residential concentrations of poverty (Hiebert 2005, Wang and Truelove 2003). The relocation of settlement services for newcomers to suburban neighbourhoods has lagged behind, creating a mismatch between newcomer settlement patterns and service provision. Some researchers have suggested that a change from core funding to contract funding agreements between government and non-governmental settlement agencies contributed to the spatial mismatch and reduced diversity of service alternatives because the competitive bidding process forced ethno-specific immigrant settlement agencies to co-locate and follow the directives of larger immigrant multi-service agency partners (Sadiq 2004). However, more recently in British Columbia, the introduction of new programs in the suburbs surrounding Vancouver aims to improve access to services for new immigrants residing in suburban areas, especially those in higher poverty communities. Yet this relatively new phenomenon of immigrant incorporation in suburban communities remains understudied, and additional research on the match between services available to new immigrants in the suburbs as compared to inner city communities has the potential to help assess the effectiveness of these new programs as well as identify new gaps and concerns that could be met to improve the resources available to newly arrived immigrants in these contexts. How does service provision from immigrant multi-service provider organizations and ethno-specific organizations to newcomers living in residential concentrations of poverty differ between the suburbs and the inner city of Vancouver?

TITLE: THE ROLES OF RELIGIOUSLY AFFILIATED SETTLEMENT AGENCIES IN BC: PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE

DOMAIN: Citizenship and Social, Cultural and Civic Integration

P.I.: *Paul Bramadat*, Centre for Studies in Religion and Society, University of Victoria

Religiously affiliated settlement agencies (RASA) have always played, and continue to play, vital roles in immigration to Canada in general and British Columbia in particular. However, we know very little about these groups themselves, the kinds of social capital or social cohesion they may foster, and the ways they may or may not work effectively with governments. This lacuna in research and policy knowledge is problematic, since we are arguably witnessing major changes in both the formal policies toward and public narratives about refugees and

immigrants in Canada and the state of religion both in Canada and abroad. The goal of this project is to assess the effects of secularization processes on Canadian RASA, the obstacles and opportunities RASA experience in light of the changes occurring in Canadian religion(s), and the ways they do or might partner with provincial and federal governments. Researchers will conduct interviews with key organizers of five BC RASA about their groups as well as the role their RASA plays in the integration of newcomers to BC. The data from the project will be compared and contrasted with analogous information from a parallel research project to be undertaken simultaneously by three colleagues affiliated with the Prairie Metropolis Centre. These two projects will form the foundation of a future comprehensive national and international analysis of both RASA organizers and the community members they serve. Both the BC and the comparative studies will be of use to Canadian policy makers, scholars, and secular settlement groups that wish to interact meaningfully and effectively with RASA in the present and to anticipate new ways to interact with them in the future.

TITLE: PATHWAYS TO IMMIGRANT EMPLOYMENT IN THE PORT-LOGISTICS SECTOR

DOMAIN: Economic & Labour Market Integration

P.I.: *Peter Hall*, Urban Studies Program, Simon Fraser University

The port-logistics sector consists of a network of activities that begin at the waterfront and that extend to suburban distribution centres. In the process, jobs are created in traditional transportation industries, such as stevedoring, trucking and warehousing, as well as in information technology from data entry to logistics planning. Since the late 1980s, the BC Lower Mainland port-logistics industry has undergone rapid growth and profound transformation (Hall and Clarke, 2010). Although still under-represented relative to the immigrant share of overall employment in Vancouver CMA, between 1991 and 2006 the share of immigrants increased from one-fifth to one-third of all port-logistics workers. Furthermore, different immigrant populations appear to be concentrated in specific industry and occupational segments. Examining how immigrants find employment in a single but diverse sector can add to our overall understanding of immigrant labour market outcomes. How do immigrants find work in sub-sectors that comprise port-logistics in the BC Lower Mainland? How do pathways to employment differ by industry sub-sector and occupation? What are the implications of this differentiation for immigrant labour market outcomes, as well as for policy? This project combines quantitative and qualitative analysis, and builds on my ongoing port-logistics research. Further analysis of Census

microdata from 1991 to 2006 will identify immigrant employment patterns and outcomes. Employment life-histories of immigrants in the various sub-sectors, as well as interviews with employers, unions, labour brokers, government, training and assistance organizations will uncover the training, search, recruitment and hiring processes behind the Census numbers.

TITLE: IMMIGRANTS' HOUSING EXPERIENCES IN THE OUTER SUBURBS OF VANCOUVER AND TORONTO

DOMAIN: Housing & Neighbourhoods

P.I.: *Carlos Teixeira*, Human Geography: Community, Culture and Global Studies, University of British Columbia - Okanagan Campus

Immigrants must have several basic needs met before they can be successfully integrated into a new society. One of the most important of these is access to adequate and affordable housing. While this has long been a concern in cities such as Vancouver, Toronto and Montreal, it is also increasingly an issue in the growing outer suburbs of major metropolitan areas where the supply of affordable housing and immigrant settlement services is limited. This study will evaluate the social characteristics and housing experiences of immigrants in the rental and homeownership markets in the outer suburbs of Vancouver (Richmond and Surrey) and Toronto (Markham, Richmond Hill, and Vaughan).

Key questions to be addressed include: what are the socio-demographic profiles of immigrants living in the outer suburbs? How does the availability of different types of housing inform an immigrant's decision to locate in the outer suburbs? What housing services exist to support immigrant settlement in the outer suburbs? What is the immigrant's current housing situation, and what barriers (e.g. ethnic background/race, language, income, source of income) have they faced in obtaining affordable housing in a suitable neighbourhood? What coping strategies are immigrants using? How do their housing conditions change over time? What integrative role, if any, does a welcoming community play in the successful inclusion of immigrants in the outer suburbs? Finally, what policy changes are recommended to remedy issues identified in this study?

TITLE: IMMIGRATION AND SOCIAL COHESION IN METROPOLITAN AREAS: THE EFFECT OF NEIGHBOURHOOD ETHNIC DIVERSITY AND IMMIGRANT GENERATION

DOMAIN: Housing & Neighbourhoods

P.I.: *Zheng Wu*, Department of Sociology, University of Victoria

The proposed research project is an investigation into the relationship between immigration and neighbourhood cohesion in Canada's metropolitan areas. This project builds upon our previous research on how immigrant status influences social inclusion and national belonging (see MBCWorking Paper No. 10-10). This previous research concluded that the local environment (place of settlement), life stage at immigration, and living in an immigrant-headed household are important indicators of the social integration of immigrants and their descendants. The purpose of the proposed research is to determine whether these factors are also relevant for understanding community well-being and the strength of neighbourhood social relations, focusing on perceived cohesion. Cohesion is a manifestation of the material and social structural conditions that bind individuals together and encourage positive interactions within and between groups – hence, it is a pillar of civil society and social order. Perceived cohesion represents an attitudinal attribute that captures an individual's subjective appraisal of the local social environment and quality of her or his membership within it. In our research, perceived cohesion will be operationalized (measured) according to (a) sense of trust in neighbours, (b) sense of neighbourhood social support, and (c) sense of belonging to the local community.

TITLE: NATIVE-IMMIGRANT DIFFERENCES IN PROMOTION OPPORTUNITIES AND THE ROLE OF FIRMS

DOMAIN: Economic & Labour Market Integration

P.I.: *Andrew McGee*, Department of Economics, Simon Fraser University

Labor market discrimination against immigrants and the income inequality that it encourages may occur through promotion decisions rather than through hiring and wage decisions. The research objective is to study systematic differences in promotion opportunities between natives and immigrants in Canada and address the following specific questions:

1. Do immigrants, on average, face a lower probability of promotion compared to their native-born counterparts in Canada?
2. To what extent are differences in promotion opportunities related to individual characteristics such as language proficiency, education, labor market experience, job seniority, etc.?

3. To what extent are differences in promotion opportunities related to observed employer characteristics such as industry, size, profitability, existence of a grievance system, on-the-job-training, existence of collective bargaining agreement, etc.?
4. If immigrants face a lower probability of promotion than their native peers, to what extent is this difference due to within-firm glass ceilings (i.e., barriers within firms that prevent immigrants from getting to higher hierarchical levels compared to their native counterparts) versus sorting across firms (i.e., overrepresentation in firms that offer fewer opportunities for promotion/underrepresentation in firms that offer more opportunities for promotion)?
5. How do differences in promotion opportunities vary at different parts of the wage distribution? Do immigrants face an economy-wide glass ceiling insofar as they face a lower probability of promotion at the top of the wage distribution?
6. Do differences in promotion opportunities vary among recent and non-recent immigrants? Among white and visible minority immigrants?

TITLE: THE IMMIGRANT REAL WAGE GAP

DOMAIN: Economic & Labour Market Integration

P.I.: *Nicolas Schmitt*, Department of Economics, Simon Fraser University

This study will investigate whether conventional estimates of the immigrant real wage gap are understated because they do not account for regional variation in living costs. It is motivated by four observations: (1) Canadian and U.S. immigrants earn less than comparable native workers, and this wage gap has widened; (2) Real wages (wages of individuals in terms of purchasing power) are typically calculated by dividing nominal wages by a single, nation-wide consumer price index; (3) Housing costs, the largest component of these indices, vary substantially across metropolitan areas; and (4) Immigrants tend to concentrate in metropolitan areas with high costs of housing. Recent research indicates that the real wage skill premium is smaller than previous estimates suggest since college graduates concentrate in metropolitan areas with a high cost of housing (Moretti, 2010). Analysis of this kind has not been performed on the immigrant wage gap. Given observations (1)-(4), accounting for differences in living costs may imply a larger gap in real wages between immigrants and native workers. We will use the Canada and U.S. Censuses to investigate this idea. If the wage gap is wider than previously thought, this leads to a secondary research question: Why do immigrants cluster in expensive cities if they already

earn less than native workers? The theoretical model presented in Moretti (2010) provides a useful starting point here, and may be modified to accommodate features of models of immigrant clustering (e.g. Gross and Schmitt, 2003) and culturally specific local amenities or government services.

TITLE: HABITS AND HOME MAKING ACROSS THREE IMMIGRANT COHORTS

DOMAIN: Settlement, Integration, and Welcoming Communities

P.I.: *Nathanael Lauster*, Department of Sociology, University of British Columbia

"Please make yourself at home" is both an everyday invitation and a welcome extended through policies encouraging immigration to Canada. Given the widespread concern over the making of home, it is especially striking that we have so little idea how people do it. Securing housing, for instance, is clearly connected with making a home, but the terms of house and home are not at all synonymous. Here we suggest that people make themselves at home through the habitual relationships they develop with their built and social environments. In this project, we propose to study what sorts of habitual relationships people have to their environments, both before and after migrating to Vancouver from China. What are daily habits of prospective immigrants like in China? What are the daily habits of recent immigrants to Vancouver like? How do they differ from the habits of more established immigrants? Do immigrants find ways to re-establish old habits in order to feel at home? Or do they develop new ones? Which paths of habit establishment best correspond to feeling at home in Canada? These questions have been little studied, in part because of the lack of good data. But recent advances in conceptualizing and recording habitual behaviour, mapping relationships to place, and gauging individuals' sense of home allow these concepts to be empirically observed, both qualitatively and quantitatively. A multimethod approach will be taken incorporating the mapping of daily lives across space, activity diaries, intake inventories, photo elicitation, and two in-depth qualitative interviews.

TITLE: LEARNING TOGETHER: THE SETTLEMENT OF KAREN GARS IN LANGLEY, BC

DOMAIN: Settlement, Integration, and Welcoming Communities

P.I.: *Jennifer Marchbank*, Explorations in Arts and Social Sciences, Simon Fraser University

The arrival of a large number of government-assisted refugees (GARs) from protracted refugee situations poses challenges for settlement, particularly given the lack of a pre-existing community for most of these refugee groups coming to BC. Beginning in 2006, approximately 750 Myanmar (ethnic Karen from Thailand in exile more than 15 years) have been destined to BC. These refugees are a relatively new group to settle in British Columbia, and represent the first to be settled in large numbers outside of the usual receiving municipalities, with over 250 (or 33%) of Karen GARs destined to Langley BC. As such, this study aims to assess how and how well settlement has transpired in this new area of refugee residence, which is a smaller centre on the edge of the Lower Mainland. In an effort to strengthen the analytical value of the study and its methodological rigour, we also aim to create a comparative context with other equivalent groups (Acehnese and Bhutanese refugees in Vancouver) for which data are available. Specifically (a) what are the settlement and integration outcomes five years after arrival (e.g. housing, employment, language acquisition, participation in Canadian society)? (b) how, if at all, did pre- departure orientation prepare the Karen for life in Canada/BC? (c) what is the impact of settling a large group of GARs in a new settlement location, from the perspective of the GARs and of Langley-based stakeholders actors? A focus on youth that mirrors earlier research with the Bhutanese will strengthen the value of the project.

TITLE: INITIAL HOUSING CONDITIONS AND IMMIGRANT INTEGRATION

DOMAIN: Economic & Labour Market Integration

P.I.: *Fernando Aragon Sanchez*, Department of Economics, Simon Fraser University

New immigrants to Canada often face harsh economic and social conditions initially after arrival. Many of them lack the social networks, experience, or language skills to find a suitable home or employment (Hiebert 2009). These initial differences may hinder their ability to develop as individuals and to integrate to Canadian society. In this project we focus on one important initial difference: housing conditions. After landing, immigrants tend to start their new life in relatively crowded, poor quality housing, far from job opportunities. The research question we address in this project is whether initial housing conditions, such as crowding and neighborhood quality, matter for new immigrants' future development and integration.

In particular, we will address the following questions:

1. What are the effects of initial housing conditions on new immigrants' economic and social performance?
2. How do these effects differ by immigrants' characteristics, e.g., country of origin; class of immigrant; educational background, existing social and family ties?
3. Do these differences persist over time?

A priori it is not clear what the effect of initial housing is. Take for example living in a remote neighborhood. This may increase the costs of finding a job and of developing a social network. On the other hand, if distant housing is more affordable, then it can help the newcomers to save. The objective of this research is to provide credible empirical evidence of the net effect of these initial settlement conditions.

TITLE: REGULATING IRREGULAR MIGRATION: EXAMINING THE US-CANADA SAFE THIRD COUNTRY AGREEMENT SIX YEARS AFTER IMPLEMENTATION

DOMAIN: Justice, Policing, and Security

P.I.: *Catherine Dauvergne*, Faculty of Law, University of British Columbia

On December 29, 2004, Canada and the United States implemented the Safe Third Country Agreement ("STCA"), a bi-lateral agreement designed, among other things, to enable both states to better manage the problem of unauthorized or irregular migration and to exercise greater control over their shared border. Shortly after its implementation, the validity of the STCA was challenged before the Federal Court of Canada. In November 2007, the Court released its judgment, declaring the STCA to be of no force and effect, and outlining many of its problems and deficiencies. In May 2008, the Court of Appeal reversed this ruling to restore the validity of the STCA, but did not address its many shortfalls. The proposed research project picks up where the Court of Appeal left off: its aim is to evaluate the effect of the Safe Third Country Agreement since implementation. More specifically, it aims to critically evaluate whether the STCA has been successful in enabling Canada to exercise greater control over its border so as to curb the problem of unauthorized migration. By combining qualitative data collection with a rigorous literature review, the project will provide a comprehensive treatment of the STCA's implementation in Canadian law. In addition to producing a scholarly publication, the project will produce a data bank to be used for future projects of its kind, and also offer positive proposals for law reform. In stark contrast to some recent media portrayal of refugees as "potential terrorists" are the work of civil society groups in interior B.C

and the resultant supportive media in those communities striving to sponsor refugees and create welcoming inclusive communities for their reception. Through promoting a deeper understanding and commitment to ensuring that the voices and actions of civil society groups regarding commitment to embrace newcomers, this project has huge potential to contribute to enhancement of our rural social fabric.

ABSTRACTS:

From Aceh to Vancouver: Migration & Conflict in a Post-tsunami Context: A video produced by Jennifer Hyndman on the Aceh refugees was screened, and a short discussion followed. Research was presented regarding the settlement of Acehnese government assisted refugees (now Canadian permanent residents/citizens) in Vancouver 5 years after arrival. Afterwards policy implications/suggestions were presented, and a wrap-up discussion resulted in several points being made in relation to Canadian policy.

Canada's Experience with Diversity & Migration Roundtable: A presentation to a delegation of 13 Danish senior civil servants and civil society officials. Topic discussed: the lack of success of immigration and integration in Canada. Douglas Todd, a reporter from The Vancouver Sun, attended as well.

Workshop on Researching Markets and Diversity: 18 academics from Europe, Canada, the U.S. and New Zealand participated in this two-day workshop. Dan Hiebert (UBC) presented a paper by himself, Jan Rath and Steven Vertovec titled "Markets and Diversity: Towards a Research Agenda". Short presentations included Negotiating local structures, Exemplifying forms of global capitalism: Enclave economies in New Zealand by Paul Spoonley; Silk Market, Beijing and the Flea Market in Brussels by Ching Lin Pang; Everyday cosmopolitan place-making: Interactions with 'the Other' in commercial streets in Montreal by Martha Radice; From the emergent market to the pirate bazaar by Olga Sezneva; Religious diversity and commercial niches by Alex Horstmann; and Representations of spatial practices in ethnic commercial districts: African and Caribbean migrants in Paris and London by Guillaume Ma Mung.

Metropolis BC Annual Research Retreat: Forty-four participants, including representatives of all levels of government, non-governmental organizations, and academic researchers, attended the ninth annual MBC Research Retreat, held in downtown Vancouver. After opening remarks by the Metropolis British Columbia Co-Directors, the meeting proceeded with a keynote speech by Deb Zehr from the Ministry of Regional Economic and Skills Development, which focused on the role of the province for present and future immigration policy in British Columbia (B.C.). The meeting continued after a short lunch with the

presentation of research findings of three recent projects funded by Metropolis. This session was followed by a panel discussion on the directions for the 2010 Call for Proposals and on the future of Metropolis British Columbia (MBC).

Teaching and Learning about Homelessness: Krishna Pendakur spoke to 40 teachers at the BC Social Studies Teachers' Association Annual Meeting in Burnaby BC. Topics discussed: the causes and consequences of homelessness, policy responses, and teaching materials to support learning about homelessness.

ABSTRACTS:

LEVERAGE

MBC has been very successful in raising external funding. In particular, the Province of British Columbia through the Ministry of the Attorney General, and subsequently through the Ministry Regional Economic and Skills Development - has committed **\$500,000** (\$100,000 per year) to our core budget. In addition, through joint funding of research projects, MITACS has committed **\$150,000** (\$30,000 per year) to Metropolis sponsored research internships. These research internships each have matching external funding from the intern sponsor - a government agency, non-profit organization or private firm - yielding up to an additional **\$150,000** (\$30,000 per year) in external funding. Finally, in Years 1 and 2 of Phase III, we have jointly funded research projects awarded through our competition process with the Asia Pacific Foundation (APF). For this, APF committed up to **\$60,000** in Years 1 and 2. Consequently, our total externally leveraged funds amount to **\$860,000** for the five years of Phase III.

In addition to these external resources, MBC has substantial financial commitments from its university partners, Simon Fraser University, the University of British Columbia and the University of Victoria. SFU has committed **\$52,000** per year in cash plus **\$30,000** (3 courses) per year in release time stipends for its Co-Director and Domain Leader. UBC has committed **\$22,000** per year in cash plus **\$50,000** (5 courses) per year in release time stipends for its Co-Director and Domain Leaders. UVic has committed **\$5,000** per year in cash plus **\$10,000** (1 course) per year for its Domain Leader. This totals \$167,000 per year, yielding **\$845,000** over the 5 years of Phase III.
